THE BIG WRITE

We teach our older children to plan their writing using the Vocabulary, Conjunctions, Openers and Punctuation (VCOP) approach. This is a very successful strategy which enables children to improve their own writing through achievable goals. Every two weeks your child will bring home a planning sheet with the task of discussing with you their plan for their 'Big Write' on the Friday.

Please talk through their planning and add any detail or ideas which you think will benefit their work. Adding 'WOW' words or ideas for dialogue between characters is a tremendous help. They will be given detailed notes on how to improve and their other written work will be marked towards their own goals—linking their achievement with success.

Parents in school

I am really keen to develop links between parents and school and will, wherever possible, invite parents in to join us for a celebration event or to share some work.

General Information

PE and Games

PE will take place on Monday and Wednesday afternoons. The children will need their PE kit in school all week. School PE kit is expected – including sports trainers or plimsolls. You may wish to provide black or blue jogging bottoms for cold weather

Dinner Money -

Dinner Money has to be paid on **Mondays** and put in a clearly named envelope, together with the child's class and the amount enclosed. Children should bring their own dinner money into the classroom, it does not need to go to the office.

Ukulele-

Holly class will be learning the Ukulele this year. These lessons will take place on a Monday afternoon.

Punctuality-

Lessons start at 9am and it is really important that children are in school on time. If they miss the register it causes a lot of disruption for everyone, especially if they are having a school dinner as they will miss making their dinner choice. Please help your child by making sure they are in school **before** 8.55. Thank you.

Absences -Please phone the school as soon as possible to report your child as absent.

Assessment

The children are assessed, particularly in literacy, maths and science. These assessments form the basis for our planning of the child's next steps in learning. They form the basis for the end of year assessment which together with the SAT results are reported to parents in the child's report. N.B. Please avoid taking your child out of school during April and May.

HOMEWORK

Homework is important to help children's learning at home as well as school. To enable us to communicate, each child has a reading diary. The expectation is that this is brought to school everyday and handed in to the class teacher. Children will also be provided with a homework book in which to complete written homework. I will set homework on a Friday and it is due back the following Thursday. Maths homework may be set online on our Active Learning page.

The recommended time to spend on homework is:

Year 6 - 2.5 hours per week, roughly half an hour every weekday night.

Homework will include:

- Reading: share and enjoy a book together every day for 10 minutes
- Learn weekly spellings and word meanings. These will be handed out on a Monday and tested the following Monday.
- Maths activity 1-2 pieces a week
- Big Talk Homework once a fortnight on a Wednesday in preparation for the Friday's Big Write
- Grammar activity
- Blooms Project related to curriculum (three times a year)

Children are expected to read with an adult at least **three** times a week. This should be recorded in the reading diary. Children will receive rewards if the reading record is completed. Further guidance is included on the next page.

Helping your child-

You can have a big impact on your child's learning. One way you can assist your child is to encourage them to complete their homework and to spend time reading with them. Also, simply asking what they learned today and listening to them talk about their work helps them to remember learning from the day. READING

Please listen to your child read at least three times a week, and share your own reading material with them. Record any reading in their reading record book with your signature.

Children should read fluently and expressively and show a good understanding of what has been read. Ask children questions about what they have read. For example:

Do you like the book?

What do you think might happen next?

How do you think the character is feeling?

WRITING AND SPELLING

Children should write independently using appropriate, interesting language, and correct punctuation. Stories should be a logical sequence of events with a clear beginning middle and end. Capital letters should be used appropriately and sentences punctuated correctly with full stops.

Children should attempt to spell most words by applying spelling rules or by phonically sounding them out.

In class we teach the children spelling rules or 'sounds'. They will be expected to use these when attempting new words.

HANDWRITING

All children are expected to follow the agreed school handwriting style and use cursive handwriting. Children start off using pencil and have to earn a pen licence to write in pen. I would like your help in encouraging the children to practise their handwriting and foster a sense of pride in their work. I expect a high standard of work in their homework books and your positive encouragement of this at home would be greatly appreciated.
